

Compensating our carbon footprint what will it take? Some answers in the woods?

Thanks to pupils from Priory School "Chalking up the Benefits", we now have a rough idea of what a small area of woodland in the Lewes Railway Land Nature Reserve is doing for us. The InfoGraphic below illustrates this and gives us some idea of what Carbon Compensation for people in Lewes District would look like when translated into a physical area of woodland!

Partnership work between Colin as *Chalking up the Benefits* Project Officer and John Parry of Lewes Railway Land Wildlife Trust led to John bringing year 10 pupils and their teachers down to the Railway Land for a practical session back in 2013 which included measuring an area of mixed native woodland to calculate how much carbon it was sequestering. The pupils used a 'Rule of Thumb' guide from staff at the [UK Carbon Code](#) it's a simplification of scientific reality, but gives us a reliable ball-park figure.

The data on carbon emissions comes from [REAP](#) via Ecofootprint work done by Colin with the Sustainability team from LDC during 2008/2009.

Naturegain in motion - update!

Thanks to Ruth O'Keefe, all 3 councils based in Lewes (Town, District and County) have now passed a motion recognising the value of local natural capital to Lewes, its residents and our local economy.
